





The 'Art, Space, Mobility' Project is an attempt to write the history of pre-modern art by placing the focus on the connectivity of cultures.

Created by Hannah Baader, Avinoam Shalem, and Gerhard Wolf and run together with a changing group of young scholars, the project follows an agenda both theoretical and practical.

Conceptually, it investigates the historical construction of cultural borders; it analyzes the goals of historiography and questions the terminology of art history, especially when dealing with national identities.

Practically, it tries to move past the compartmentalization of knowledge that shapes academia today as well as to advocate an approach to art history that foregrounds large-scale political phenomena.

The project unfolds by a series of fellowships and events (lecturers and conferences, field trips and summer schools) designed to bring together a large number of scholars coming from different disciplines and countries.

This workshop is one of them.
